Generative artificial intelligence is transforming professional practice, offering powerful efficiencies while raising complex ethical challenges—particularly in protocol and diplomatic contexts where trust, discretion, and cultural sensitivity are paramount. This plenary examines the responsible use of generative AI through a protocol and diplomatic ethics lens, focusing on where technology can appropriately support professional work and where human judgment must remain central.
